

Chile, a wine-producing country

Chile is and always has been an international leader in the field of sustainable wine growing. Eighty percent of Chilean wine exports are certified sustainable, representing one of the most regionally diverse and eco-friendly wine selections on the planet. Chile is also known as the producer of premium quality wines, from elegant cold-climate wines to fruity full-body wines, with a quality and value of great consistency.

The path taken to become one of the main global exporters of wine today is surely a long journey—from 1540 when Chile was conquered by Pedro de Valdivia, to 1980 when the Spanish producer Miguel Torres arrived in the country and modernized wine production. Fast forward to today's situation, in fact, wine has been one of Chile's top exported products for a very long time. According to OEC, Chilean wine occupies 5.43% of the global market since 2017, making Chile the world's 5th largest exporter of wine.

Though there are several factors contributing to wine quality, Chilean topography takes up the biggest part. The cool Pacific Ocean on the west, the snowcapped Andes Mountains on the east, the Atacama Desert on the north, and Patagonia on the south create such amazing borders that isolate all the Chilean vineyards from foreign elements and gives its characteristic innocuity.
